Community Games programme – a further update

The Community Games toolkit was launched in Much Wenlock on May 27th along with the proposed programme of events, with a simultaneous on-line launch. The project will encourage communities to design their own sporting or arts-themed events and opening and closing ceremonies. These events, estimated at 100 in number across the sub-region with a target audience of 15-20,000, will be held in 2011 and 2012. It is anticipated that ten professional event organisers will be recruited to run training alongside the community groups, along with a team of advocates. It is estimated that 5000 volunteers will be involved in the project across the West Midlands.

It is envisaged that a host of less formal 2012-related events will also take place on the back of the Community Games project.

Shropshire County Council has granted residential archery planning permission to Eaton Manor for its Olympic size indoor archery range. Eaton Manor has over 500 acres and was a working family farm for 4 generations. Recently the family has diversified, successfully creating luxury holiday houses, and following a specific request from members of the UK Olympic archery team, the Madeley family, owners of Eaton Manor, agreed to create an Olympic size indoor archery range.

The Madeley family has worked very closely with members of both the Olympic and

Commonwealth archery teams to develop this archery facility to the highest standard. Nichola Madeley explained: "We are delighted to have been granted residential planning permission for our archery range. We are very grateful to both the Olympic and Commonwealth archery teams for all the help and advice they have given us while we've been creating these facilities. We are now looking forward to welcoming these national teams here to Eaton Manor to train. It is of course especially exciting as we approach the 2012 Olympic Games and it is yet another elite training facility in Shropshire".

Jonathan Edwards, Deputy Chair of LOCOG Nations and Regions and Vice President of the Wenlock Olympian Society will join the West Midlands Culture Programme for London 2012 on 27 May in Much Wenlock to launch one of the region's major cultural programmes, Community Games. From dance and handball to quoits and space hopper races the Community Games programme provides advice, guidance and support to enable communities to stage their own Community Games bringing the inspiration of London 2012 to their own streets, towns and cities across the region. Funded by Legacy Trust UK, an independent charity set up to build a lasting cultural and sporting legacy from the 2012 Olympic Games, Community Games draws on the inspiration of Dr William Penny Brookes' original concept for the Wenlock Olympian Games in Shropshire. 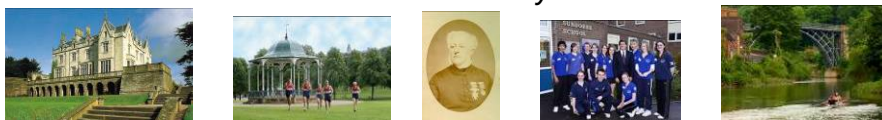
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LOCOG (26 May 2010)

London 2012 outlines vision for welcoming the Olympic Flame to the UK

The London Organising Committee of the Olympic and Paralympic Games (LOCOG) today announced that the Olympic Flame will arrive in the UK on Friday 18 May 2012 and will travel around the UK for 70 days, arriving in London the weekend before the 2012 Games begin.

- Olympic Flame to arrive in UK on 18 May 2012
- 70 day Torch Relay around the UK
- 8,000 Torchbearers
- 95% of the UK population to be within a one hour journey time of the Torch Relay
- Presenting Partners – Coca-Cola, Lloyds TSB and Samsung

In line with the bid promise to inspire and connect a new generation to the Olympic Movement, 8,000 torchbearers will be selected with over half of the places expected to go to young people. There will be a torchbearer nomination process, expected to be announced in May 2011, giving people across the UK the chance to be involved in this historic countdown to the start of the London 2012 Games.....

Sport England (10 June 2010)

Sport and Olympics Minister sets out Olympic sports legacy plans

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Plans to reform sport and deliver a lasting legacy from the Olympic and Paralympic Games were set out by Hugh Robertson, Minister for Sport and the Olympics, today. Speaking to Olympic sport bodies at the British Olympic Association he announced new sports legacy priorities, with a stronger focus on facilities and sport at a community level. Sport England will implement these new priorities.

Minister for Sport and the Olympics Hugh Robertson said:

“Delivering a mass participation legacy for sport from London 2012 is one of my three top priorities. I want to see a marked, and sustained, cultural shift toward greater participation in sport.

“So I have today informed Sport England that, going forward, it will have two clear priorities; supporting sports governing bodies through the Whole Sport Plans and delivering a mass participation sports legacy from London 2012.

“To deliver this Sport England will focus on improving facility provision and developing sport at a community level.”

The Secretary of State has made it his top priority to deliver a renewed emphasis on competition both within and between schools. Work is underway to develop an Olympic and Paralympic style school sport competition. More details to follow in the next few weeks.....

The Inspire mark will be awarded across many sectors, including sport, culture, education, environment and enterprise. Successful applicants will be those presenting outstanding, non-commercial projects that are truly inspired by the London 2012 Games.

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Cultural projects that gain the Inspire mark will then become part of our Cultural Olympiad.....

Queen Elizabeth II Fields Challenge (7 June 2010)

HRH Prince William becomes Patron of new campaign protecting playing fields in the UK

Prince William launched The Queen Elizabeth II Fields Challenge today, a programme to mark Her Majesty The Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Prince William will also become an active Patron of the new campaign.

This exciting project, led by the charity Fields in Trust, aims to protect 2,012 playing fields across the UK by 2012, the year of The Queen's Diamond Jubilee. This initiative has particular pertinence given the other landmark occasion scheduled for 2012 - the London Olympics.

Playing fields continue to be under threat of development with a new report issued in May 2010 indicating that 6,000 playing fields have been lost since 1992 alone. Access to outdoor space is vital for communities. It can help improve social cohesion and reduce levels of obesity and anti-social behaviour, which is why this ambitious challenge will be the largest ever programme to protect and improve outdoor recreational space in the UK. Fields in Trust will encourage Local Authorities across the country to nominate fields to be

protected as part of the scheme. They will then challenge the public to create their own legacy by voting for their favourite field to be protected and become a Queen Elizabeth II Field. This voting process will take place in 2011 and votes will be cast at www.qe2fields.com

Prince William said: "The year 2012 marks the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and I cannot think of a more fitting tribute to my Grandmother's 60 glorious years on The Throne than to dedicate to The Queen this programme that will save playing fields for future generations....."

In his first key-note speech on tourism policy, Culture Secretary Jeremy Hunt said that it was a Government priority to produce 'the best marketing plan that any country has ever had' around 2012.

Pledges

Mr Hunt today pledged to:

- create a new fund that will generate £1bn worth of PR and marketing activity in our priority markets in the years around 2012
- harness the full potential of 2012 to create a permanent tourism legacy for the whole country, creating a sustained and sustainable increase in the number of tourists visiting our shores
- set the industry a new goal: to increase the domestic tourism spend by UK residents to 50% of the total
- review the web of quangos that affect tourism, aiming to simplify and focus support for the tourism industry, which is worth around £90 billion to the economy

Youth Sport Trust (27 May 2010) London 2012 anticipation

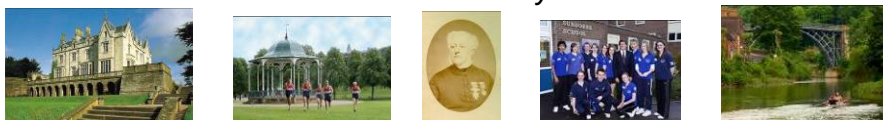
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London 2012 excitement is already spreading amongst Britain's schoolchildren despite the Games still being over two years away, according to research on behalf of Lloyds TSB. Eight out of ten schoolchildren surveyed are excited about the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games with six out of ten inspired to take part in more sport.

The research also highlights that 87 percent of schoolchildren are keen to try a new Olympic or Paralympic sport as Lloyds TSB launches National School Sport Week which runs from 28 June to 2 July 2010 – an initiative in partnership with Youth Sport Trust and part of the London 2012 Get Set education programme.

Despite the enthusiasm, 40 percent of Olympic sports have never been tried by 93 percent of children surveyed. But with nine out of ten children keen to try new sports, Lloyds TSB National School Sport Week meets this demand by providing over four million British schoolchildren with the opportunity to try an Olympic or Paralympic sport that they have never experienced before.....

Youth Sport Trust (15 June 2010)

School sport system leads the world

Baroness Sue Campbell spoke in the House of Lords (14 June 2010) and outlined how the country's school sport system is among the most envied of the world. The Chair of the Youth Sport Trust joined other Peers as they took part in the first debate on the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games since the recent General Election.

The debate, called by the new coalition Government, was an opportunity to repeat cross-party support for the Games and confirm that all preparations were still on track along with the mission to deliver a 2012 legacy.

Baroness Campbell outlined the work of the Youth Sport Trust over the past 10 years to create "an infrastructure for school sport that many countries see as the most outstanding in

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the world.”She added: “It is critical that we sustain participation among our young people, which is the greatest legacy that we can achieve.”

Baroness Campbell pointed to the development of 450 School Sport Partnerships, which include every primary, secondary and special school, and, just as importantly, the community providers, such as clubs, community coaches and volunteers.....
